About Child Aid Lanka

Child Aid Lanka is a UK-based unincorporated voluntary association and a registered charity, charity number 1115204. Child Aid Lanka was first established in 1998 as an independent, apolitical, multi-ethnic association to raise funds to help the underprivileged children of Sri Lanka. It became a registered Charity in May 2006.

The Charity's objects are:

to relieve financial hardship, sickness and poor health, and to advance the education, of underprivileged children in Sri Lanka.

Child Aid Lanka is governed by a board of Trustees, elected by the members at the AGM, or appointed by the Trustees themselves. All Trustees hold office until the end of the AGM following their election / appointment.

Child Aid Lanka relies upon the efforts of a large number of volunteer supporters — Child Aid Lanka's members, a wider network of friends and supporters and a small team of voluntary advisors.

Child Aid Lanka currently has 10 life members and 4 members and 227 friends who are regularly updated on our work

Membership rules

To be a member of Child Aid Lanka you must:

- support the aims and objects of the Charity;
- be resident in the UK and be over 18;
- pay the membership fee:
 - o annual £10.00 (unwaged £5.00)
 - o life £100.00 (unwaged £50.00).

Annual membership runs from 1 December to 30 November:

- fees received before 1 September will be effective up to the following 30 November;
- fees received on or after 1 September will be effective from the following 1 December.

All Child Aid Lanka's fundraising activities are carried out by volunteers/friends — it has no paid staff — so that as much as possible of the money raised can be spent on its projects in Sri Lanka (see page5).

What Child Aid Lanka Does

Child Aid Lanka organises activities in the UK and seeks donations from individuals and organisations in the UK and across the world, to raise funds that it invests in initiatives to help underprivileged children in Sri Lanka.

Over the years, Child Aid Lanka has supported a range of projects that have helped a great many children in Sri Lanka. They have included child care centres and a trust for the Prevention of Child Abuse, medical facilities, vocational training schemes, tsunami relief, and providing solar power to an orphanage. Child Aid Lanka has provided financial support and donated items including books, computer equipment and medical supplies. Child Aid Lanka delivers these projects through carefully selected partners and community-based charitable organisations in Sri Lanka. Using personal contacts and working with organisations that understand local conditions, Child Aid Lanka can ensure that money and effort is directed effectively to those in need.

Child Aid Lanka's priority projects during 2013-2014 were providing clean water and funding computer education.

Providing clean water

Child Aid Lanka is setting out on a programme to work with local community organisations in Sri Lanka to construct wells to give families a secure supply of clean water.

Child Aid Lanka is funding the construction of wells in and around Malayalapuram village in the Vanni, about 100 km south east of Jaffna, where families are now trying to resettle, having been displaced by years of fighting in the area. The construction work is managed by Kaveri Kala manram, a



community development organisation based in the Vanni, and employs local villagers, providing families with a secure supply of water for drinking, sanitation and irrigation.



In 2014 Child Aid Lanka has funded the completion of 3 wells and started another two. We have requests for another 2 wells and are waiting for KKm to provide proposals for our agreement. A further two well proposals were rejected as they did not meet our criteria, one did not wish to allow other families to use and another was via an alternative organisation in Jaffna but was nearly three times the average price we have been paying to KKm.

Funding computer education

Child Aid Lanka is working with Sri Lankan schools and colleges to provide computer education to students from poor families. Child Aid Lanka is funding students aged between 11 and 18 from local free government schools, whose families cannot afford to pay for education, to take a yearlong supplementary computer course. The course is provided by the Informatics Institute of Technology (IIT), a respected and well equipped college in Jaffna, and will prepare them for further more advanced study and give them the chance of accessing a secure career.

During 2013-2014, Child Aid Lanka and IIT can provided a year-long supplementary computer course for £57.00 per student. Child Aid Lanka funded 40 students, who completed their course in March 2014. Sadly due to financial pressures, IIT will not be continuing in 2014-2015 and we have to move our resources elsewhere.

Summary of Activity in 2013 – 2014

Expanding our network

Last year we concentrated on rationalising our activities and presentation material along with formalising various governance issues. This year we have concentrated on making Child Aid Lanka more visible to the world. Examples of that are:

- Developing lines of communication with WaterAid to provide advice on water projects.
- Setting up an "EasyFundRaising" campaign to encourage people to shop online while simultaneously donating money to Child Aid Lanka at no cost to them. (See Page 8)
- Preparing a "Time for Questions" event in South London which will happen in January 2015 featuring many high profile politicians. We are hoping this event will be broadcast live on radio. (See below)
- Imperial College Sri Lankan Society contacting us as a result of last year's web site campaign who will direct some of their fund raising via our charity next year.

Visits to Sri Lanka:

Between February and March 2014 Naomi Aruliah, Trustee, visited Sri Lanka. She met with Reverend Joshua Sivanganam and visited all the wells being constructed in this season.

In August 2014 Sean McQuaid and his family also met with Reverend Joshua Sivanganam and visited all the wells ensuring completion in this season

Activities and events in the UK:

In February 2012 Child Aid Lanka provided a lunch time learn session for Cheam Baptist church and a collection was taken that raised 120 pounds.

The major effort for the year was put into the Carshalton environment fair which was a disaster due the torrential rain on the day. Although it was the same format as last year where we raised 1000 pounds we barely broke even this year. This will impact next year's accounts since the account reported here cover from June 2013 to June 2014.



Future Developments

The current Trustees have suggested the following areas of priority for the development of Child Aid Lanka in 2014–15 (subject to decisions of the new board of Trustees):

- Continue to develop and implement credible strategies for fundraising via
 - Corporate Sponsorship
 - School and personal sponsorship

We suggest for the present time we concentrate all our activities on water now that IIT no longer exists. Part of that task could involve:

- Developing stronger relationships with professional organisations like academic institutions and WaterAid to ensure our charitable work is sustainable.
 - Already WaterAid have been giving helpful advice on the relative merits of wells versus rain water harvesting

- Jaffna University has supplied helpful papers on water quality issues in the North of Sri Lanka
- We suggest a pilot project be set up on rain water harvesting.

NAOMI ARULIAH

Naomi has been involved in charity work focusing on Sri Lanka for 30 years; having been president for the Methodist College Old Girls Association and Child Aid Lanka on many occasions. She is the



founder of Child Aid Lanka and has worked relentlessly to build it to its current position. The impetus for setting up Child Aid Lanka came from a visit in 1998 to a prison in North Colombo where very young children

were being held for child sex and petty offences due to deprived and disadvantaged circumstances. There was little attempt to rehabilitate them and Naomi decided to set up a charity to help all unfortunate children in Sri Lanka under the guiding principle of "helping children help themselves".

IAN BLAKE(B.A. DIP. ED.)

lan obtained a Diploma in Higher Education and a degree in Theology in the late 70's and then was ordained into the Church of England in 1980. Presently he is vicar to St. Paul's church, Thornton Heath, London.



Ian has been involved in various charity works in Sri Lanka for fifteen years starting with a visit to the country to build houses. He became involved in Child Aid Lanka whilst on the staff of a church in Cheam,

Surrey in 2001.

Other charity work that Ian has undertaken includes work with international organisations including "Samaritan's Purse" in Belarus, Romania & Serbia.

SEAN MCQUAID (B.A OXON, M.B.A)

Sean graduated from Oxford reading physics and



later obtained an MBA from Business Cass School (formerly City University Business School). He has run businesses various presently he is a Director of **ERC** Geophysics at Equipoise, an oil and gas

consulting firm.

Sean has been involved for twenty years in providing support to various charities including being Chairman for 5 years of the Kingston Explorers Club, which provided parental support and Saturday activities for gifted but challenging children.

Although he has provided practical support to Child Aid Lanka since its inception, this year he has decided to join as a trustee to help progress the Wells project.

TREVOR PERERA (B.SC. M.SC.)

Trevor graduated from the University of London in Electronics in 1980 and earned an M. Sc. in Medical Electronics and Physics ten years later. He has worked as a Clinical Scientist in the NHS and is presently Deputy Manager in the field of Medical Electronics and Physics.

He has been the President of St. Aloysius' College Old Boys Association in the UK and has served as



in the same organisation.

A previous Treasurer, he has been actively involved in Child Aid Lanka since soon after its inception, contributing both in Sri Lanka and in the UK and presently provides focus on

the IT project.

He has directed fundraising and organising events for several schools and developed several promotional ideas with leading supermarkets.
